






The Message of I Peter Grace and Glory for Suffering Exiles

The Apostle Peter, writing to believers who are suffering as aliens in a hostile context (perhaps under the persecution of Nero in AD 62-64) reminds his readers of the glories of their salvation and their position as those who are holy and have hope of future glory with Christ and encourages them to endure suffering, whether it is unjust or not, in light of their redemption because it is following the example of Christ and will result in great reward in order to exhort his readers to live steadfastly before God in faithfulness, holiness, and love as they suffer for the glory of God.













PETER & HIS FAMILY

- Mentioned 188 times in the NT, he is the most well known of the original disciples. Simeon (Hebrew) and Simon (Greek) are each used 49 times.
- 3. His nickname, given by Jesus, is Cephas, means "Rock" or "Rocky" (Jn 1:42).
- 4. Son of Jonah (Mt 16:17).
- 5. His brother, Andrew (Mk 1:16, 29; Jn 1:40, 44) who was a disciple of John brought him to Christ (Jn 1:35-42).
- 6. He was married and came from Bethsaida (Mk 1:30: 1 Co 9:5).
- 8. He was a successful family fisherman (Mt I:18; Mk I:16; Lk 5:1-10).

HIS MINISTRY

- I. He was the first disciple Jesus called (Mt 1:18; Mk 1:16; Lk 5:1-10).
- 2. He is always listed first among the disciples (Mk 3:16-19, et al).
- 3. He was brash and impulsive (Mk 9:5-6; Jn 13:8-10; Ac 10:14 et. al).
- 4. He was courageous in confessing Christ (Mk 8:28) and preaching at Pentecost (Acts 2).
- 5. He took the Gospel to the first Gentile (Ac¹0).
- 7. He is the main character in Acts 1-12.
- 8. He had a conflict with Paul in Antioch over separating from Jews (Gal. 2:11-14).
- 9. He wrote to churches in Asia Minor (I Peter) and Church History associates his later ministry with Antioch, Corinth, and Rome where he is said to have been crucified upside down by Nero in 64/65.


Therefore, with minds that are alert and fully sober, set your hope on the grace to be brought to you when Jesus Christ is revealed at his coming. (1:13)

Introduction to I Peter

Peter, an apostle of Jesus Christ, to those who reside as aliens, scattered throughout Pontus, Galatia, Cappadocia, Asia, and Bithynia, who are chosen according to the foreknowledge of God the Father, by the sanctifying work of the Spirit, to obey Jesus Christ and be sprinkled with His blood: May grace and peace be yours in the fullest measure.





I) one who comes from a foreign country into a city or land to reside there by the side of the natives, 2) a stranger, 3) sojourning in a strange place, a foreigner, 4) in the NT metaphor in reference to heaven as the native country, one who sojourns on earth (NET).

aliens, foreigners, sojourners, refugees (παρεπίδημος)



"Strangers in the world" points to the fact that Christians are "pilgrims" who do not reside permanently on earth. They belong to the heavenly realm (cf. Eph. 2:19; Phil 3:20; Heb. II:I3-I6).



Foundation of Hope

Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who gave us new birth (I) flowing out of his great mercy (2) resulting in a living hope •which is kept in heaven for you, by God's power •through faith in the salvation prepared, to be revealed in the end

- •through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead (3) pointing to an imperishable, unspoiling, unfading inheritance





The important thing to see here is that biblical "hope" isn't just wishful thinking. We say things like, "I hope it doesn't rain" or I hope the Razorbacks win" but biblical hope is so much more than this. Hope, as the Bible understands it, is a confident expectation that God will keep his promises. Faith is oriented to the present while Hope is attentive to the future. To say we have hope is to say that we have a future, that we have something solid to look forward to.



Foundation of Hope

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Two things are happening here. First each word starts with "ά" {alpha privative - "a" at the beginning of a word indicating negation, i.e. "agnostic" and "atheist"}; secondly, each word ends with the same sound " $\tau o \nu$ ". Peter is obviously trying to be poetic by stringing these three words together.





The Culmination of Hope


The Old Testament writers eagerly anticipated the gracious good news that was fulfilled in Christ's death, resurrection, and exaltation.





Culmination of Hope

Concerning this salvation, the prophets who prophesied about the grace that was to be yours searched and inquired carefully, inquiring what person or time the Spirit of Christ in them was indicating when he predicted the sufferings of Christ and the subsequent glories.





searched and inquired (ἐξεζήτησαν καὶ ἐξηραύνησαν)

These two words reflect an investigation that is *intense* and *thorough*. Josephus uses the combination to refer to an invading military force going from house to house seeking information and questioning residents.



Culmination of Hope

Concerning this salvation, the prophets who prophesied about the grace that was to be yours searched and inquired carefully, inquiring what person or time the Spirit of Christ in them was indicating when he predicted the sufferings of Christ and the subsequent glories.





Christ is presented in I Peter as a model, and his example beckons the reader in two fundamental ways: (I) He suffered, like them, and (2) he was vindicated like they will be.

Culmination of Hope


It was revealed to them that they were serving not themselves but you, in the things that have now been announced to you through those who preached the good news to you by the Holy Spirit sent from heaven, things into which angels long to look.



things into which angels long to look (είς ἃ έπιθυμοῦσιν ἄγγελοι παρακύψαι) The two words used to describe the angels yearning to understand the nature of our salvation highlights both the desire (the first word is a common word for "lust" or "zeal") and fascination (the second word means literally "to lean the head sideways"). The angels are curious about our salvation.
